Minister's Message

Sisters and Brothers.

Please note change in usual schedule: April gathering is 1st Sunday of month.

I hope you are having a Blessed Lent in preparation for Easter. We accomplished a significant formation goal this Lenten season by reviewing our Franciscan Rule in 3 separate articles here in the Sandal Prints. I hope you had a chance to read them and accepted the invitation to read at least one verse per day during Lent, either from the Gospel or our Way of Life. It is easily accomplished, since there are only 28 verses in our Way of Life. We could easily cover our Way of Life in a day or a week, much less a month. We are invited to Gaze, Consider and Contemplate Christ in our Way of Life or the Gospel (Gospel to Life or Life to Gospel) by Easter.

This past weekend, we accomplished another significant goal we set shortly after the Q. We committed to gather together on a voluntary Day of Community separate from our monthly Fraternity gathering or any other previously scheduled Day of Reflection or Recollection, commission or committee meeting, etc. The purpose of our gathering was intended simply to better appreciate the gift of each other, to see Christ in each other through faith sharing. While we faith share deliberately in each Fraternity gathering and presumably at least occasionally in local groups, there is a difference when the intention of the gathering is simply to voluntarily to spend time loving each other.

For those dozen or more that were able to make it, it was a time to better get to know each other, share our faith journey, and spend some time in reflection on our Way of Life. The culminating question we asked ourselves and shared with each other is from our Reflection on the Rule this Lent, what one thing from the Rule motivates our life and why did we become Secular Franciscans? It was a chance to stir the gift of Faith in each other and to better Love One Another. Our unifying scripture was John 15: 16-17:

It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain, so that whatever you ask the Father in my name he may give you. This I command you: love one another.

Many expressed an interest to have a day of community on a somewhat regular basis. There seems to be some interest to meet as a whole, rather than only meet in local groups. We'll include this suggestion as an item to consider in our annual fraternity evaluation. Thanks for everyone who was able to participate. Several others expressed the desire to attend, but had previous family or work commitments. As a final commitment to each other,

Rule Reflection - We Turn to Others

In the first two articles (February & March) on the Rule, we were reminded that God initiates a relationship with us by first turning towards us and then we are to reciprocate this relationship, by turning towards God. This part three of a three part series from our Formation FUN manual is on why and how we turn towards others.

Scripture teaches us that God has reached out to us. God, in Christ empties Himself as a total self-giving. We imitate Christ in His humility. Bonaventure says that love is a union that desires to become one with another; this is also called compassionate love.¹ Teresa V. Baker, OFS, the author of the FUN lesson, tells us that our purpose in turning to others is to reflect God's goodness and love to others because God reflects His goodness and love to us. St. Francis shows us an example by embracing the leper after his conversion. With this background of giving to others, we can look closer at the specific articles in our Rule to examine the "how" that is important as we turn to others.

Articles 11-19, 22 and 24 give examples for us in our everyday lives. They address areas such as trust, community, justice, work, respect, unity, fraternal harmony and communion to name a few. As we read through these articles we are enlightened as to how we can grow in humility toward all of God's creation. In article 13," Secular Franciscans with a gentle and courteous spirit, accept all people as a gift of the Lord and an image of Christ." Francis would look at everyone as an image of Christ. Spiritual Exercises in Everyday Life

During our March Fraternity meeting, our guest speaker, Heidi Franklin, presented on the Spiritual Exercises in Everyday Life (SEEL) program. She gave us some background on the exercises and a little biography on St. Ignatius of Loyola. We were given 2 handouts and had some quiet time to prayerfully read them. Afterward we met in small groups for faith sharing.

One handout was called "Examen of Consciousness", wherein the process for an "awareness examen" was explained. It is different from an examination of conscience. The Examen of Counsciousness is a way of exploring how God is present within the events, circumstances, and feelings of our daily lives. The following is one of the four Examen methods that can be used to review your recent day:

THANK YOU

Everything is a gift from you, God my creator. I give You thanks and praise for the gifts of the day.

HELP ME

Holy Spirit, give me increased awareness of how you are guiding my life.

(G.C. 13.2) says we should firmly commit ourselves to oppose every form of exploitation, discrimination, and exclusion against every attitude of indifference in relation to others.

In order to exemplify Christ, we are blessed with many opportunities to convert, change and grow in our awareness of giving to all God's creatures, especially the people in our lives each day.

Our penitential life encompasses our ability

- To be detached from the inordinate things of life
- To be free and open to acknowledge God and care for those around us
- To reverence the divine seed in the other
 - ♦ To promote
 - Catholic family values
 - Peace, justice and ecology as the basis of an egalitarian world
 - Work as a cooperation in God's creative activity
 - ♦ To encourage youth and young adults
 - ♦ In a spirit of perfect joy
 - ♦ In fraternal community

Read through articles 11-19, 22, 24 underlining how they speak of turning towards the other.

How will I respond to everyday situations with the spirituality of Jesus present in those around me?

Reflect and share with another person your insights.

Eat More, Meat Less

Fool-Proof Quiche

1 9-inch pie crust

1-2 cups filling ingredients, like bacon, mushrooms, onions, and spinach 1-2 cups (3 oz - 6 oz) grated cheese, like Gruyere, Swiss, or Cheddar 3 large eggs

1 cup (8 oz) milk

1/2 cup (4 oz) cream

1 teaspoon salt

Blind-Bake the Crust: Line a 9-inch cake or pie tin with parchment and spray the sides with non-stick spray. Roll out the pie crust and fit it into the tin. Trim away any overhang and reserve for patching up any cracks that appear during baking. Freeze the crust for 30 minutes. Heat the oven to 350°F. Line the pie crust with parchment and fill with pie weights or beans. Make sure the weights are snug against the sides of the pan. Bake for 20 minutes and remove the weights and parchment. Bake for another 10 to 15 minutes until just starting to brown. Cool.

Prepare the Filling: While the crust is baking, prepare your quiche filling. Make sure all ingredients are cooked through and fairly dry. (i.e., make sure spinach has wilted and that cooked mushrooms have released all their

moisture.)

Prepare the Quiche Filling: Sprinkle half the cheese over the bottom of the pie crust and top with the fillings. Sprinkle the remaining cheese over top. **Prepare the Custard Filling:** Whisk together the eggs, milk, cream, and salt until frothy. Pour the custard into the pie crust.

Bake the Quiche: Bake the quiche at 350°F for 30 to 40 minutes, until the edges are set but the quiche still jiggles a little in the center. Cool for at least 20 minutes, but ideally overnight.

Quiche can be served cold, room temperature, or warmed. If serving warm, heat in a 300°F oven until just warm to the touch.
