Minister's Message

Sisters and Brothers,

Spring has many changes. And, with the announcement of the passing of Sr. Loretta's mom and Tricia's dad, I have been reflecting on death. A few weeks ago, Tom Wolf, who had photographed the Transitus for us, passed away in his sleep. The previous evening, he had gone to band practice, came home and prayed the Divine Mercy Chaplet with his family, went to bed and died. Tom was an outstanding amateur photographer and willingly volunteered his services to us. Both expected and unexpected deaths hurt our hearts and we must give ourselves time to grieve.

We usually think of spring as a time of new life but for me, spring has been a time of death. My father passed away unexpectedly in his sleep on Palm Sunday many years ago. My mother died Easter Monday nearly two decades later. Though her death was anticipated, I was stuck in Central Oregon with a dead battery on Easter morning when all the garages were closed. When I was finally on the road for the three-hour drive to the hospital the next day, I learned of her death via voice message only after I had cleared Santiam Pass, which didn't have cell service. As I continued my drive, I began to notice the bright green colors of the Willamette Valley (unlike the high desert of Sisters, OR where it can snow in June). I knew my mom was at peace and smiling at the earth as it was awakening from winter slumber.

Grieving is an all-consuming process and affects us in body, mind, and spirit. Sometimes we grieve over a loss of something, rather than a death of a loved one, including over the disappearance of the familiar. With death, we know that our loved ones unite with our loving God for eternity. I like how Pope Francis is confident that our pets will join us in heaven, which make sense because many times we feel fulfilled by the love of a special creature. But when we lose things that have been our comfort, we don't have such an assurance.

I know this also as a parent, watching my second child grow into adulthood. Sometimes I look at her and can barely see the little girl she used to be. I miss the days when she fit into my lap or would hold my hand, a time when I could influence her hopes. Yet, I still have a future with her, a future still to be unfolded. I am just not in control.

But grieving the loss of the way things used to be is much more difficult, much scarier. I felt this when I got divorced. There wasn't a predictable future or outcome. Think of your favorite living room chair as it wears out from regular use. Even if you get the same type of chair from the same store as a replacement, it doesn't fit the same or smell the same. Spiritual Reflections

Holy Week and Easter came early for me this year. The Paschal Mystery of death and resurrection has been deeply a part of my soul's experience since March 17, the day my mother was embraced by Sister Death, and at the time of her burial, March 24. There is such a primal feeling at the time of a Mother's death. It is only viscerally felt.

The mystery of death truly settled in my heart as my brother and I held my mom's hands as she was breathing her last breaths . . . peacefully. It is so sacramental to be present to the journey into Eternal Life. The mystery of resurrection comforted me as I left Spokane early March 25. There was a radiant resurrection sunrise of intense light. Brother Sun was revealing to me that life had not ended for my mom, just changed; for she was now face to face with the Risen Light, Jesus the Risen Christ.

The bittersweet experience of deep loss as well as the celebration of a beautiful life leaves me unable to really articulate my heart's reflections as memories return unbidden. Now, the process of grieving unfolds, supported by loving family and friends. May I grieve well. So many of you, too, have experienced the death of a loved one. As people of faith, as a people in Christ through our baptism, there is no separation in the communion of saints. The blessed space between ourselves and those who have gone before us is very thin just on the other side of our skin.

While there are so many spiritual writers who try and express their experience of death through poetry, reflections, Scriptural quotes, I find myself, at the moment, leaning into words of John O'Donohue, Celtic Catholic scholar and author who writes:

"We do not need to grieve for the dead. They are now in a place where there is no more shadow, darkness, loneliness, isolation, or pain. They are home. They are with God from whom they came.

In eternal time, ALL IS NOW; time is presence. I believe that this is what eternal life means: It is a life where all that we seek -- goodness, unity, beauty, truth, and love -- are no longer distant from us but are now completely present with us."

Blessed Season of Resurrection to each and every one of you. May the Risen Christ bless you with Easter peace.

We have no time for lamenting. When we celebrate our 70 years of being a fraternity in August, we will honor the past by looking back as well as look to our future. St. Clare Fraternity is creating something new. We are embracing our future as an intercultural fraternity, made up of passionate people in love with our God and following in the footsteps of St. Francis. We are a people of hope!
