We have had a wonderful warm summer with colorful flowers. And, except for the newly arrived gray skies, I am enjoying the beauty of autumn. After nearly two decades in the high desert of Central Oregon with its dusky evergreen hues, I marvel at nature as I watch the leaves change colors. I also greatly appreciate that I live in an apartment and don't have to rake.

Most of you know that I work at a small parish as the Pastoral Minister in SE Portland. But this time, my pastor offered me a whole new way of thinking that stopped me in my tracks. He said, "I want you to slow down so that you can enjoy your job." Wow! No one had ever said that before! No one had given me a reason to slow down that had any meaning to me.

Now as I walk between buildings, I try to breathe deeply and admire the trees as their leaves change to bright autumn colors. I try to stand more erect and be conscious of each step I take. I then have the time and mindfulness to thank God for the great job I have and an amazing boss.



A Transition for Sister Loretta

By now, members of the fraternity have received a copy of Sr. Loretta's letter of resignation. She presented each of us the letter personally at the last council meeting. I had a chance to speak with her privately before the meeting. Though dismayed about her decision, I was not surprised. On top of her regular commitment to St. Clare, which includes monthly meetings of both the council and fraternity plus quarterly meetings of the formation team, Sr. Loretta visits both St. Francis (Eugene) fraternity and the St. John emerging fraternity in Boise, ID. Her responsibility as the region Spiritual Assistant and developing a training program for Secular spiritual assistants has filled her time.

I asked Sr. Loretta to consider working with our fraternity in the manner she works with Eugene and Boise. I proposed that she visit us on a quarterly basis whereby she could remain a resource for us as well as possibly lead a retreat day or give an on-going formation presentation. This would allow her to maintain friendships she has forged over the last six years and provide some continuity for us regarding formation matters. She said that she would take time to discern the idea. Please keep her in your prayers as she discerns and prepares for this transition at the end of the year.

St. Clare in the News

Those of you living in Oregon, did you see the latest copy of the Catholic Sentinel? Our very own Tricia Fryer was quoted on the front page!! She participated in an interview regarding sacramentals. She highlighted the prayer value of both the Franciscan Crown rosary and use of the San Damiano cross.

The Catholic Sentinel earlier carried a short article inviting people to join us for the Transitus at St. John the Baptist. I had sent them a press release and a flyer. I was quite distressed when the print edition of the paper used the term Lay Franciscans. I sent the writer a gentle reminder that nothing I had submitted carried the name "lay". I also included some explanations that I thought might be helpful.

"Secular" is the opposite of "Religious". "Lay" is the opposite of "Clerical". Recent popular cultural usage of the word 'secular' sort of means bad, or antireligious. In this context, 'religious' is being interchanged with holy or righteous. But in the Church, 'secular' means one who lives in the world and can inherit. Thus, diocesan priests are secular (no vow of poverty). Members of religious orders, i.e. Jesuits, Dominicans, Franciscans, SOLT, AJ, etc., hold everything in common and cannot inherit. So, you can have secular clerics and religious clerics. There are secular orders and clerical orders. It is always a challenge with the ancient wording of the Church and the modern American vernacular.

The writer apologized for her error and corrected the online version of the article. The Catholic Sentinel has been a good support for increasing public awareness that our order exists and that we are active within the Archdiocese of Portland.



Oscar Romero (1917–1980) Canonized October 14, 2018

Oscar A. Romero, Archbishop of San Salvador, in El Salvador, was assassinated on March 24, 1980, while celebrating Mass in a small chapel in a cancer hospital where he lived. He had always been close to his people, preached a prophetic gospel, denouncing the injustice in his country and supporting the development of popular and mass organizations. He became the voice of the Salvadoran people when all other channels of expression had been crushed by the repression.

A Future Not Our Own

It helps now and then to step back and take a long view. The Kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is beyond our vision.

We accomplish in our lifetime only a fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work. Nothing we do is complete, which is another way of saying that the kingdom always lies beyond us. No statement says all that could be said. No prayer fully expresses our faith. No confession brings perfection, no pastoral visit brings wholeness. No program accomplishes the Church's mission. No set of goals and objectives include everything. This is what we are about. We plant the seeds that one day will grow. We water the seeds already planted knowing that they hold future promise.

We lay foundations that will need further development. We provide yeast that produces effects

far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing this.

This enables us to do something, and to do it very well. It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest.

We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker. We are workers, not master builders, ministers, not messiahs. We are prophets of a future not our own.

This prayer was composed by Bishop Ken Untener of Saginaw, drafted for a homily by Card. John Dearden in Nov. 1979 for a celebration of departed priests.

World Day of the Poor

November 18, 2018

Pope Francis has named the thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary time the World Day of the Poor. Here is an excerpt from Pope Francis' message (available at https://w2.vatican.va/content/francesco/en/messages/poveri.index.html):

"I would like this year's, and all future World Days, to be celebrated in a spirit of joy at the rediscovery of our capacity for togetherness. Praying together as a community and sharing a meal on Sunday is an experience that brings us back to the earliest Christian community, described by the evangelist Luke in all its primitive simplicity: 'They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers... And all who believed were together and had all things in common; and they sold their possessions and goods and distributed them to all, as any had need' (Acts 2:42.44-45)."



12 Months of Franciscan Peace

Adapted from the 12 Weeks of Franciscan Peace by Carolyn D. Townes, OFS, National Chair for JPIC in the United States

Each month focuses on one specific PEACE building block and will include a connection to the prior month, a short explanation of the month's theme, a Psalm fragment, a Reflection Question and a prayer for the Month.

The thought for the **second month was EMPATHY.** Empathy requires focusing full attention on the other person's message. We give to others the time and space they need to express themselves fully and to feel understood.

Psalm Fragment:

"You will show me the path of life; In Your presence is fullness of joy;

At Your right hand are pleasures forevermore." ~ Psalm 16:11

Reflection Question: When someone is in need, do you offer them your presence or your advice?

Prayer for the month was: "Lord, grant me the spirit of patience to be present to someone who is hurting or in need. May I be Your presence to them. I pray in Jesus' name. Amen. "

For the 3rd month, the theme is LISTENING.

When we hear, we hear with just the ears. When we listen, we listen with the whole body – ears, eyes, heart, posture, mind – open and empty.

Many people wrongly assume that listening is a passive process of being silent while another person speaks. We may even believe that we are good listeners, but what we are often doing is listening selectively, making judgements about what is being said, and thinking of ways to end the conversation or redirect the conversation in ways more pleasing to ourselves.

So when (Joseph and Mary) did not find Jesus, they returned to Jerusalem looking for him. Now so it was that after three days they found him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the teachers, both listening to them and asking them questions. And all who heard him were astonished at his understanding and answers. (Luke 2:45-47)

The work of active listening takes place up in your head; ...It requires a sacrifice, an extension of oneself, to block out the noise and truly enter another person's world – even for a few minutes. Active listening is attempting to see things as the speaker sees them and attempting to feel things as the speaker feels them. This identification with the speaker is referred to as *empathy* and requires a great deal of effort.

Our Lord Jesus was an active listener, just as His mother. It took great discipline to listen to the words of the angel Gabriel. Mary did not hear what she wanted to hear; she listened to the words, asked a clarifying question, then gave her fiat – her yes to God. You must truly listen in order to properly respond.

Psalm Fragment:

"Oh, that my people would listen to Me, that Israel would walk in My ways!" – Psalm 81:13

Reflection Question: When was the last time you sat down in quiet and listened to God speak to your heart?

For this month: Be mindful about listening to the conversation you are engaged in – without interrupting or distractions. Then, spend some quiet time actively listening to God in the Scriptures.

Prayer for the month:

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because He has anointed me.

To preach the gospel to the poor;

He has sent me to heal the broken hearted, To proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind,

To set at liberty those who are oppressed;
To proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord.
