Minister's Message

Sisters and Brothers,

In March, we had a presentation on human trafficking. It was both informational and disturbing. Thankfully, one thing the presenting group included was a list of actions and opportunities we could undertake if we wanted to be more involved. One group listed was Rahab's Sisters.

Rahab's Sisters is a safe space for women to gather each Friday night where they are served dinner, have time off the street or away from 'boyfriends' and pick up needed supplies such as socks, underwear and hygiene items. It operates out of St. Peter and Paul Episcopal Church on SE 82nd between Burnside and Stark. Volunteers serve the female guests (and those who self -identify as female), most of whom are 'unhoused' and over 45 years old. Some are prostitutes; many are addicts, and many are women of color.

Rahab's Sisters emphasizes 'Radical Hospitality.' From 7-10pm it is a place for women helping women no matter the guest's condition. Actively using drugs is discouraged, but no woman is turned away. Their vision is to live in the city of Portland where all women are safe from physical and sexual exploitation, offering a warm safe environment with nutritious food, hot coffee, conversation, and personal hygiene necessities. "Our sisters are welcomed without judgment, no strings attached."

I signed up to be a volunteer since I have one Friday evening a month that I don't have to work. And, even though I work full time in parish ministry, I am mindful that I still need to volunteer, to do service, for which I am not paid. The orientation that started at 5:30pm included a tour of the gathering space, discussion of services provided, and what to expect once the doors opened. At 6:30pm we gathered in the kitchen so that the volunteers could meet each other, review the schedule for the evening and know what was offered for dinner. At 7pm, the uniformed security guard was positioned at the front door (to keep the men out) and the doors were opened to welcome the guests. I had a chance to wait tables, work the drink station, monitor bathroom usage and to retrieve supplies for women. I also had the opportunity to have dinner and engage in conversation with a couple of women (and one dog).

Midway through the evening, the director took the new volunteers out to the parking lot, so we could observe the needle exchange program in action. Multnomah County Health Department staff were busy showing addicts how to use Narcan (for overdose recovery), counseling folks about rehab options, and exchanging needles. It is a program that I had heard about, but had never seen in action.

History of St. Clare Fraternity

June 11, 1948

<u>St Clare Fraternity canonically established at</u> <u>St. Clare Parish</u>.

At the time, there were 4 other fraternities in Portland: *Third Order of St. Francis* (1916) Renamed

- St. Bonaventure Fraternity (1939) (Ascension Parish)
- St. Anthony (1917/St. Anthony Parish, Tigard OR)
- *St. Francis* (1924/St. Francis Parish)
- St. John Vianney (1944/Cathedral Parish)

1958: St. John Vianney Fraternity became inactive. Members transferred to St. Clare Fraternity or St. Bonaventure.

1964: St. Francis Fraternity became inactive. Members transferred to St. Bonaventure.

1968: St. Clare Fraternity moved meeting from St. Clare Parish, Portland, to St. Anthony Parish in Tigard, OR. Met separately from St. Anthony Fraternity. Provincial advised both to merge and become St. Clare Fraternity.

1969: St. Anthony Fraternity became inactive. Active members transferred to St. Clare Fraternity.

1973: A satellite from St. Clare Fraternity was initiated, taking the name of St. John Vianney.

1978: St. Bonaventure became inactive. Members transferred to St. Clare Fraternity.

1982: St. John Vianney of 1973 canonically established.

1992: St. John Vianney became inactive. Active members transferred to St. Clare Fraternity.

1997/98?: St. Clare Fraternity moved gathering to Franciscan Renewal Center.

2000: St. Clare Fraternity moved gathering to Ascension Parish.

2005: St. Clare Fraternity moved gathering to Christ the King Parish, Milwaukie, OR.

2018: St. Francis Fraternity, Eugene, sponsored by St. Clare Fraternity reactivated.

Presently, St. Clare Fraternity sponsors emerging San Buenaventura Fraternity, Ascension Parish.

After three hours at Rahab's Sisters, the new volunteers were released to go home and reflect on the experience so as to discern a decision about making a six-month commitment. I went home and had so much to process. I couldn't settle down to sleep until late into the night. The next few days I was lost in thought as I tried to process my experience. I was truly out of my element.

There had been a table of donated items that were outside their program's parameters, which anyone could take at will. One basket had colorful foil wrapped items that I thought were small samples of shampoo. It wasn't until I really felt the packets that I realized they were condoms. Condoms just aren't part of my little Catholic parish world. It is one thing to know <u>about</u> transgender people as a concept, or an item in the news, and another thing to greet one as a sister. I wasn't prepared to see older Asian women who were homeless or the very skinny women who turned tricks on 82nd. It really showed me how disconnected I am from the lives of these women.

This experience of Radical Hospitality has changed me. I have had to acknowledge my discomfort and to recognize my limitations. Would I be able to give one Friday a month to Rahab's Sisters? Finally, after two weeks of prayer and discernment, I have accepted that I cannot make a six-month commitment. (My priority has to be my family and our fraternity.) But, I can help each 5th Friday, which happens about 4 times a year. And, I can offer to assist them behind the scenes with grant writing, etc. It has been humbling to know that I am not invincible.

Please keep those involved with Rahab's Sisters in your prayers. They are always in need of laundry soap and toilet tissue as well as personal items such as tampons, toothbrushes, toothpaste, travel size shampoo, travel size conditioner, and new underwear and socks. The volunteers offer each guest dignity and respect. The space they offer marginalized women is a vital service. It is a small port in a wild storm where women can hang out and be safe.

Stigmata of St. Francis: 3 Ways for Holiness

In September, Franciscans throughout the world commemorate the day Francis received the Sacred Stigmata of Christ. One can say that this was God's way of answering the prayer of Francis. He asked God for two things. One, to let him experience the suffering Christ endured on the Holy Cross and two, for him to experience the love in which He did it. Receiving the Sacred Stigmata was an experience that led Francis to be totally transformed, leaving in his heart a marvelous fire in the remaining years of his life.

According to the writings of Saint Bonaventure, Saint Francis was "led by divine providence to a high place apart called Mount La Verna." (*FAED II, Ch. 12*) Two years before his death, in what was his usual custom of fasting for 40 days in honor of Saint Michael the Archangel, Saint Francis would "experience more abundantly than usual an overflow of the sweetness of heavenly contemplations." (*FAED II, Ch. 12*)

In the days of the Exaltation of the Cross, Saint Francis was praying on the mountainside of Mt. La Verna and he saw a six-winged seraph, *fiery as well as brilliant, descend from the grandeur of Heaven*. Bonaventure writes, *as the vision was disappearing, it left in his heart [Francis] a marvelous fire and imprinted in his flesh a likeness of signs no less marvelous*. The Sacred Stigmata of the Crucified Christ were now embroidered into St. Francis and the mark of Christ's love were now visible to him and all who were around him. Here are some lessons from Francis' experience that can help us in our own journey towards holiness.

Be Marked.

Be Marked by the love of the Beloved. Bonaventure tells us that it was a custom of St. Francis to never rest from lifting himself up in prayer. He was always found in praver, seeking the solitude of the quiet he would frequently go off to pray. He made himself available to God by his own desire to be transformed by God. He prayed out of perfect joy and perfect love, because of this, the very marks of Christ's wounds were engraved in him. The beauty is that God wants to make His mark in us, He wants to trace us with His love and respond to our reaching hearts. The mark may not be a physical mark but an indelible, unfading and enduring mark of love and unity. The challenge, is allowing God to transform our lives just like He did for St. Francis. If you haven't yet, allow God to make his Mark within you, and trust that through that mark, your life will be a fulfillment of His love, and a mark of discipleship. By this mark of love, we can enter into a relationship of prayer with Jesus Christ.

Gaze on the Crucified Christ.

When Francis witnessed the six-winged seraph, he immediately recognized the likeness of a man crucified.

His hands and feet both extended in the form of a cross. At this, he eventually would learn that he would be transformed into the likeness of Christ crucified not by death but by the enkindling of his soul. Francis gazed on the Crucified Christ and it allowed him to be transformed. We can look on Christ crucified and recognize a poor, humble God who is the ultimate example of humility. The gaze for us is having an openness to God through the embrace of our hearts so that we too, can be transformed by the very seraphic spirit of God. It is a call to encounter God not only in the cross, but also in the suffering of our own humanity. By this gaze, we can have a real connection with those who are poor, those who are suffering, and those who are in fact, wounded in our own societies. It can also be a connection with ourselves who are often dead and broken from the effects of sin. In either one, the gaze on the Crucified Christ can guide us into a complete transformation out of ourselves and into the realm of the other, regarding their poverty, woundedness, suffering and lowliness with love. This is what St. Francis did. And it's what Jesus did!

Look to the Cross

In Francis' experience of the six-wing seraph, not only did he see a man who had been crucified, but he saw a man who has fastened to a cross. In Francis's life, and even in today's Franciscan spirituality, the cross is a constant source of prayer. Francis had a deep love for the Cross and for him it was a reminder of when Christ first spoke to him at Damiano. The cross for us is where we can encounter God's love, it points us to the Resurrection and the truth that even in the most horrific and excruciating of deaths, God can still triumph. That example of the cross teaches us that despite death, chaos and violence there is in fact, glory, grace and peace. It reminds us that God is always near to us! Lastly, Bonaventure writes that the cross is a place where we can meet God and where the embrace of life with the cross can bring us to the happiness of our desires.

As we remember the Stigmata of St. Francis, may we always remember that Christ is present within us, wanting us to enter into His eternal glory. He places his mark within us and asks that we reach out to Him with a loving embrace in order that we be transformed just like St. Francis.

"Christ on the cross bows his head, waiting for you, that he may kiss you; His arms are outstretched, that he may embrace you, his hands are open, that he may enrich you; his body spread out, that he may give himself totally; his feet nailed, that he may stay there, his side open for you, that he may let you enter there." -St. Bonaventure
